HOME GROUP STUDY

1. Name some ways being in community with the body of Christ has blessed you and encouraged your spiritual growth.

2. What tends to hold you back from leaning in to community? In what ways do you need to be convinced to push back against a tendency toward isolating yourself?

3. Look at the *EFFECTS OF ISOLATION* on the sermon notes. How have you seen these played out in your own life? What other effects or dangers of isolation can you think of?

4. Vulnerability and transparency can look different for people depending on factors such as upbringing, personality type and even regional preferences. How can we encourage transparency in community while at the same time respecting where others are in their spiritual journey?

5. Why is being in community so important for our soul training? How do we persevere in community even when it's hard or doesn't seem to yield any benefits we can see?

6. Writer and pastor Paul Tripp says: *"Corporate worship is a regular gracious reminder that it's not about you. You've been born into a life that is a celebration of another."* How can you begin to put the focus of community where it belongs and shift it away from what you feel or prefer?

"Fellowship with the body of Christ is God's great classroom of the development of Christian character. We are benefitted by both the strengths and weaknesses of the fellowship. The mature ones help to strengthen and encourage us, while the weaknesses in the less mature give us the opportunity to practice our spiritual growth. Get involved and stay in faithful fellowship with the body of Christ! Don't run off if something disappoints you or you get your feelings hurt—this only demonstrates immaturity and places you in further danger of losing out with God. If you alienate yourself from fellowship, you will be regressing down a path that leads away from God."

"Worship gatherings are not always spectacular, but they are always supernatural. And if a church looks for or works for the spectacular, she may miss the supernatural. If a person enters a gathering to be wowed with something impressive, with a style that fits him just right, with an order of service and song selection designed just the right way, that person may miss the supernatural presence of God. Worship is supernatural whenever people come hungry to respond, react, and receive from God for who He is and what He has done. A church worshipping as a creature of the Word doesn't show up to perform or be entertained; she comes desperate and needy, thirsty for grace, receiving from the Lord and the body of Christ, and then gratefully receiving what she needs as she offers her praise—the only proper response to the God who saves us."
