HOME GROUP LESSON

"The meaning and significance of this celebration of the "last supper" was almost totally missed by the disciples. They did not understand what Jesus was doing, and they were busy thinking about the identity of the betrayer, their own sadness, and who was the greatest among them. He told them that He was to be betrayed, and that His betrayer was at the table, one of them. At a time when Jesus' rejection, suffering and death were imminent, here He is, reaching out one last time to Judas, warning him of the destiny which awaits him if he follows through with his plan to betray Him. Both the sovereignty of God and the responsibility of man are underscored by Jesus' words. The Son of Man was going, as it had been predetermined by God, and yet woe to that one who would do it. How sad that Judas did not heed this warning. How sad it was that one could be so close to the Savior, could have heard so much, and yet did not believe. How many people have thought themselves saints, when they were really wolves and not sheep, falsely religious, but not Christians. Judas was warned. He was even urged to turn from his course, but he did not. While the disciples are different than Judas, they are not that different. The principle difference between Judas and the other eleven was that they believed, they were saved, and Judas was not. But the disciples are so like Judas in that they are thinking mainly of themselves, and not of Jesus. They, too, are seeking their own self-interest. How typical—of them, and of us."

When the time came, Jesus and the apostles sat down together at the table.

Jesus said, "I have been very eager to eat this Passover meal with you before my suffering begins. For I tell you now that I won't eat this meal again until its meaning is fulfilled in the Kingdom of God."

LUKE 22:14-16 (NLT)

How is this significant as a family celebration, not just a gathering of people?
Why does Jesus instruct us to do this?*

1. What did you learn from this passage of Scripture?
2. During this pulpit series we've seen how the disciples were slow to grasp Jesus' mission and teaching, and how they focused on themselves—yet Jesus made a place at the table for each of them. In what ways are you daily like the disciples? How does it make you feel knowing that Jesus includes you at the table?
3. What in your life detracts from Jesus being the focus?
4. What will you do with what you learned from this passage of Scripture?

READ THE FOLLOWING IN GROUP IF TIME ALLOWS, OR USE IT FOR PERSONAL STUDY.

The Last Supper marked a significant change in God's relationship with us.

THE FIRST PASSOVER

The Passover began at the exodus of the Israelite nation from Egypt. The word Moses brought from God, "Let My people go" was challenged by Pharaoh: "Who is this God, that I should obey Him?" The plagues were God's answer to this question. The final plague was the death of the eldest sons of the Egyptians, which resulted in the release of the Israelites. The first-born sons of the Israelites were spared when animals were slaughtered and the blood placed on the door posts. When the death angel saw the blood, he "passed over" the house. This celebration was made an annual feast for the Israelite nation.

THE LAST PASSOVER

Let's say you go to the doctor for a check up, and he takes x-rays. He looks at the films and says, "I have good news and bad news. The bad news is, you have a deadly disease. The good news is, I promise that one day there will be a cure." You are shocked and afraid, but very glad there will be a cure.

The Old Testament Law was like an x-ray, showing each Israelite they had a deadly problem called sin. But God promised that He would send a cure. Until the cure came, God gave them a temporary solution with animal sacrifices. The blood of the animals would cover their sin, but only for a while. It did not take away their sin. Similarly, your doctor might give you medicine that would help, but not cure your disease. You would have to take bitter medicine over and over until there was a cure.

When Jesus took the cup of wine at Passover, He said it was a symbol of the new covenant. This was the cure! The new covenant did not take away the old covenant—it fulfilled it. The old covenant, the Law, said the people must be perfect. The new covenant made them perfect. When Jesus, the Lamb of God, shed His perfect blood on the cross, He took away our sins once and for all.
