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Week Nine: "I Am A Man ... Of Prayer"

"And in the early morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house, and went away to a secluded place, and was praying there." – Mark 1:35

We all know Jesus prayed, right? We all know the Lord's prayer. Maybe you can even recite it from memory. But have you ever wondered *why* Jesus prayed? After all, He was God in human flesh. He was the Son of God, and as we look at last week, He was filled by the Holy Spirit. So why did He feel the need to pray? The answer to this question is important if we are going to be men that follow Jesus' example of masculinity.
