



1. God demands total obedience
2. Disobedience disqualifies us from service
3. Before we can be effective we must be submissive

B. A serious commitment

- God requires servants that are committed to His plan
- Circumcision was a serious commitment
  - It involved sacrifice
  - It involved the shedding of blood
- Spiritual negligence has a way of negating our usefulness
- To be used by God, you must be willing to be exposed by God
- No one knew about this except Moses, Zipporah and God

**III. When obedience leads to disappointment**

A. Not what Moses expected

1. The Good – 4:29-31
  - They tell the people the good news
  - They do the signs God had given them
  - The people believe and worship!
2. The Bad – 5:1-5
  - They go to Pharaoh
  - They tell him the bad news
  - He rejects their request
3. The Ugly – 5:6-14
  - No more straw
  - No less bricks
  - No sympathy

B. Not what the people wanted – 5:15-19

- They saw their circumstances as unfair
- They viewed their treatment as unjust
- They couldn't understand why the authorities were unsympathetic
- They underestimated God's involvement
  - They blamed it all on Moses and Aaron

**IV. Our response to negative circumstances – 5:22-23**

A. We tend to become disappointed

B. We tend to become disillusioned – Vs 22

- We lose our perspective of God
- We begin to cast blame
