7 AWFUL FACTS

1. Jesus Christ would not be risen but decayed in the ground. (*v. 13*)
2. The substance of what we preach is nothing more than powerless religious chatter. (*v. 14a*)
3. Our faith is worthless because it does not have an object powerful enough to change lives. (*v. 14b*)
4. The message and experience of the apostles was a lie—so we are liars, too. (*v. 15*)
5. Contemporary believers are still in their sins, standing under the condemnation of God as eternally guilty. (*v. 17*)
6. All dead believers laid to rest are lost and will never be seen again. (*v. 18*)

DEVOTIONAL & HOME GROUP STUDY

1. Read 1 Corinthians 15:12-23. Paul's argument here is designed to show the Corinthians what would follow if one declares that there is no resurrection. If there is no resurrection, what are the general implications?

2. What would it mean in terms of your faith and your ability to be forgiven of sins if there was no resurrection? How would your daily life change?

3. Paul closes this letter with a reminder that "in the Lord your labor is not in vain" (v. 58). Why would Paul want believers to remember this?

4. How should this passage affect your attitude toward your own future? What difference should it make in your life that death is defeated?

5. What has this *Undivided* series meant to you? How has it impacted your faith and growth in Christ?

"The resurrection of Jesus—and our future resurrection—is the fundamental reality for all followers of Christ. It is the good news—the gospel—of Jesus the Messiah. The Christian life only makes sense if the resurrection is the foundation on which it stands. Christianity is not merely a set of ideas, a spiritual path, a political agenda or a rule of life—though it gives light to those things. At its heart, Christianity is good news about an event that forever changed the world. Those who live by the reality of the resurrection will never be the same again."

Firstfruits: Each year the Jews gave the first of the harvest to the Lord as a sign that the whole harvest belonged to Him (Lev 23:10-11,17,20). The significance of the first fruits, however, not only was that they preceded the harvest but that they were a *first installment* of the harvest. Christ became the first fruits at the moment of His resurrection. The rest of the crop is to follow. In other words, Christ's resurrection could not have been in isolation from ours—His resurrection *requires our resurrection*, because His resurrection was part of the larger resurrection of God's redeemed.

The resurrection of which Paul speaks here is permanent resurrection. Both the Old and New Testaments tell of persons who died and were miraculously brought back to life (1 Kin 17:22; 2 Kin 4:34-36, 13:21; Lk 7:15; Jn 11:44). But all of those persons died again. Even those whom Jesus raised—the son of the widow of Nain, Jairus's daughter, and Lazarus—eventually died again. Christ Himself, however, was the first to be raised never to die again.

Those who are asleep refers to the righteous dead, whose spirits have gone to be with the Lord (2 Cor 5:8; cf. Phil 1:23) but whose remains are in the grave, awaiting recomposition and resurrection. Through Christ, as a man, came the resurrection of the dead—just as through Adam, the first man, came death. Jesus' humanness was inextricably involved both in His resurrection and in ours. It was because Jesus died, was buried and was raised as a man that He could become the first fruits of all others who would be raised to glory.

EXERCISE FOR THIS WEEK

Read the rest of this chapter—1 Corinthians 15:24-58.

Paul knew that his teaching about physical resurrection would prompt questions (v. 35).

What does Paul say about the differences between our current physical bodies and our future spiritual bodies at the resurrection (vv. 42-45)?

What does Paul say will happen to those who are alive at the time of Jesus' second coming (vv. 52-44)?

Why must all natural, physical bodies be changed, even those that have not died (vv. 42-44, 50, 53)?

What will be the result when this occurs (vv. 54-55)?

What can we learn about the nature of resurrected bodies from Jesus' resurrected body (see Luke 24:13-42, John 20:10-21:14)?

Jesus rose from the dead! He is alive—and one day He will raise us up to be with Him eternally. What tremendous power the resurrection has, and what wonderful hope it gives!
